AFSW's Foreign Born Spouses Group recently celebrated its 25th anniversary with a luncheon hosted by long-time member Elisa Freeman (Argentina) at the Normandie Farm Restaurant. This well-attended event gave members an opportunity to share their Foreign Service experiences and reminisce about the early days of the group.

The FBS Group was formed 25 years ago by Mrs. Nancy Asencio, a native of Cuba and wife of now retired Ambassador Diego Asencio. She realized that the many women from different countries married to U.S. Foreign Service men needed an informal organization where they could meet and voice their concerns about living in the United States, a foreign land and culture to them. So the "Washington-bound FBS" was born. While the name has been shortened and members now include male spouses, the group maintains its original goals and is going strong with over 80 members from 34 different countries.

The FBS meets every third Wednesday of the month, 12 times a year from January through December. Terri to give back to the organization that had been such a fundamental part of her lifestyle. Every member of AAFSW can be glad she did. Congratulations Terri!



### A GRAND FINALE

he final AAFSW program of the 2004-2005 season was a delight to the ear, the heart, and the palate. Mr. Neale Perl, President of the Washington Performing Arts Society, spoke to us about the remarkable changes in the Washington, D.C. arts scene over the past 40 years and the contributions that WPAS has made to this renaissance. The WPAS, which is celebrating its 40th anniversary season, has helped create and improve several wonderful local performing venues. It also supports the Embassy Adoption program, through which D.C. embassies send music emissaries into public schools.

Mr. Perl told some delightful "behind the scenes" stories about well-known artists and the process of launching new world-class

performers. He described the present period as "the golden age" of fine arts, not because today's artists are so much better than those of the 20th century, but because there are so many truly great performers in the world. He estimated that in China alone there are 10 million people studying piano! There are, he says, a multitude of gifted young artists worldwide, and he feels we must actively create and educate audiences for these performers of the future.

The real treat of the program came when Mr. Perl played his cello for us, with Ralitza Patcheva accompanying on the piano. Their thoughtful renditions of Bach, Brahms, and Rachmaninoff favorites were truly captivating and greatly appreciated by all.

All the guests thoroughly enjoyed

# CHINA IN THE 21ST CENTURY: THREAT OR OPPORTUNITY?

r. Banning Garrett, Director of Asia Programs at the Atlantic Council of the United States, posed this and other provocative questions on Chinese human rights and energy and trade issues at the AAFSW's April 19th program. Dr. Garrett focused on the benefits of trade in changing Chinese foreign policy, pointing out that with the build-up of trade networks with surrounding Asian and Southeast Asian countries, China has cultivated a friendly face and is making new alliances with a wider world (Taiwan aside).

Dr. Garrett divides the world into two camps: failed states that are closed and isolated and globalized countries that are open and reaching out to the world. Trade is the binding element. China's strong ties with the U.S. and the Middle East have produced a new climate of international openness, although posing a number of problems for the U.S. The trade imbalance has to be addressed, as well as our vast debt, which China has been buying up to continue trading with us. Oil from the Middle East is vital to China's growth, as it is the second largest oil consumer in the world. China has also been looking to Africa to supply its oil.

Dr. Garrett did not touch on China's many internal problems, but rather emphasized the positive role of China's increasing interdependence produced by globalized trade policy. He did note that the greatest dangers come from failed states, like North Korea, that are the sources of weapons of mass destruction, terrorists, and humanitarian crises. To manage these problems, Dr. Garrett believes the U.S. and China should work together as partners rather than as adversaries. Perhaps cooperation in trade will lead to transformation in their foreign policy and mutual understanding. Everyone attending this interesting program was full of questions and a lively discussion ensued.


